

Internal Hemorrhoids Treatment - How to treat Internal Hemorrhoids

There are two types of **hemorrhoids** - the **internal hemorrhoids** and the **external hemorrhoids**. The only difference between the two kinds is its placement in the anus area. Internal type is located inside the anal canal, while external is found outside the verge of the anal canal or rectum.

Among the two, the internal type is always left unnoticed at first. Because it is found inside the anal canal, that cannot be easily detected. The individual having this can only realize that he or she is having this when there is already bleeding or a stain of blood got mixed with the a stool.

You will find internal sorts, though, that can be noticed easily because its sac-like protrusion from the inside grows to the external lining of the anal canal because of intensive swelling and inflammation. This causes the dangling protrusion effect that occasionally can be mistaken as the external sort.

- Treatment for this depends greatly on the extent or degree of the condition.
- The type of hemorrhoids treatment also depends on the attitude of the patient towards the kind of treatment.
- Listed here are some of the medical methods that can help rid off internal hemorrhoids:

Rubber Band Ligation

This is the usual treatment being undertaken by those who have small to medium sizes of the external kind. This process does not necessarily require the patient in order to check-in at the hospital because this is only an out-patient procedure. Rubber Band Ligation is a kind of treatment in which a small rubber band has been placed at the base of the affected area. The placement of a rubber in the said affected area cuts off circulation, restricting blood flow to the inflamed vein which will help to shrink it. Eventually it will fall off within four to seven days after the Rubber Band Ligation.

Laser Coagulation

This treatment and method involves the use of a laser device. Laser coagulation, as it is also called, is a new medical treatment relief that uses electric energy to the affected area. The electric current found in the laser device enables certain chemical reactions in the hemorrhoids which will result to the shrinking of the swollen tissue.

Injection Sclerotherapy

Injecting certain chemical solution to the swollen tissue is also another method of treatment. Patients who are not really fond of needles have to withstand the sight and the feeling of being injected with needles at this time. Stated chemical solution consists of something that can close the affected vein, disallowing blood passage in order to the area. In this manner, it has the tendency to shrink and eventually heal.

Hemorrhoidectomy

The surgical procedure in **removing hemorrhoids** is also known through the medical term "Hemorrhoidectomy." This particular surgical procedure should include the expertise of the physician or surgeon who is doing the procedure. This inner type treatment scrapes off the dangling sac-like protrusion as well those remaining swollen tissues in the anus. This is usually applicable in order to higher grades of the said condition.
